

AN INTERVIEW WITH A CLIENT AND FRIEND

I first met James Ervin in 1999 as he was leaving the Lee County Jail on his way to prison. A friend of mine, having been convicted of drug related charges, was also leaving the jail on his way to prison, and he and James had become close friends. His prison records show James as a big man 6 foot 7 inches and 365 pounds, but I know he was bigger than that; I think for awhile he was around 400 pounds. At any rate, he looked big enough to put fear into anybody. But as I got to know James, I found his heart was even bigger than his body.

Although he loves the Lord, and he can quote a Scripture for any situation, James has struggled with drug addictions for many years. We always corresponded while he was in prison, and nearly every time I talked with him, he shared how he was able to help a fellow inmate through a difficult time by sharing his love and knowledge of the Lord. I know he has changed many lives! Ron Willis and I have spent much time with James helping him change his life.

James continues to be my friend. Two weeks ago we celebrated the birthday of my friend, and his friend from jail, at my house. I might mention our friend is also celebrating six years free from drugs. (I'll get an interview with him someday) James visits us frequently and always spends Thanksgiving and Christmas with us.

He has begun studying to become a certified peer recovery specialist with Southwest Florida Addiction Services (SWFAS). He has already been assisting by leading some of their groups. Hoping that his love and experience might help some of our readers, I asked James if I could interview him.

What was life as a child like? Did you know God?

I grew up in atmosphere where both parents believed in Christ. Later, I found out these were my adoptive parents, but they loved me as if I were their very own. They christened me with the name of Buddy which stuck with me throughout my childhood as an adequate description of the character I grew up to be. Besides, my mom said we're all little friends of Jesus.

As I was growing up, I began to have identity problems --- not knowing exactly where I belonged because the other children of the family treated me differently. I was baptized in the Caloosahatchee River at the age of 9 or 10, and that was in April. What an experience, I knew Jesus Christ and I knew exactly why I was being baptized. Even at an early age, the love of God penetrated my heart with a compassion for the hurts of others, and from that moment, until now everything I've been through, whether favorable or unfavorable, was by my choice, but I was designed by God for the very purpose of being an empathetic person for those going through troubled times similar to mine.

Can you tell me why you started into drugs?

As a child, my dad introduced me to alcohol at a very early age. His premise was that if I didn't like it at an early age, I wouldn't like it when I grew up. He was partly right. I can't stand liquor now, but feeling alone and isolated, from those I cared most about, I looked elsewhere for friendship and love. I was introduced to cocaine and heroin by a close friend I hung out with. He was older than I was, saw my distress and said try this. Again, he was partly right, but by hindsight that's where the hell began for me.

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Did the drugs take away the isolation and pain?

Yes, temporarily. But, then the effect of the drugs wore off, and as the drugs wore off, the feelings I was trying to escape from came back with a vengeance. And it was back to the races to get more drugs to get rid of the feelings.

Why did you think the drugs would help if they hadn't before?

Because, then it had become a chemical dependency. I was chasing the effect of the euphoria the drugs had brought.

You told me many times you counseled people in prison about a relationship with God, why did you suggest they find solutions in Him?

Because looking in the eyes of a suffering soul really does a lot to me. And, realizing their hurt, I knew that love was the only solution, and God is love. God is love because that is the essence of who He is. Everything He does and plans is from a heart of unconditional love, not based on what I do, but based on who He is. This is something that was given to me as a gift the moment I broke the surface of the water in the Caloosahatchee River at my baptism. But, before I could begin the process of growing and touching the hurts of other people, I first had to embrace my own hurt. I couldn't deny my own feelings and hurts no matter how much I wished them away.

Why couldn't you continue to depend on God as your way to freedom and the answer to the problems you were answering with drugs?

In the process of learning God's way, I was holding on to God instead of allowing God to hold on to me. What I mean by that is when He had answered my immediate need I would let go of Him or give Him permission to back into His little box until my next crisis came up. My desperation to be nurtured and loved led me to many compromises that didn't allow the effectual love of God to take hold. To me, my relationship with my Heavenly Father had become one of convenience instead of one of necessity. As the saying goes, I was looking for love in all the wrong places.

What is the most important thing you credit with being drug free today?

God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit! And the reason I say this is what has been impossible for me has been very possible with God! And what has made this so prevalent in my life is that through quiet introspection He has shown me His love, His protection, and His presence. Whether I acknowledged Him or not, He kept His promise. He loves me unconditionally. And the reality of the fact is my agreement and cooperation with Him leads me to humbled submission, one of supreme gratitude -that the promise of that love never fails is indeed true.

What advice would you give to parents, spouses, and friends of addicts?

My first advice would be to love unconditionally and realize that addiction is a disease, and that is not a hopeless, nor incurable condition. Just as any other disease it can be treated, arrested, and overcome through the involvement of everyone, but most importantly, through God and prayer.

Parents, spouses and friends of addicts often become frustrated and angry, would you advise them to forgive the addict?

Yes! I would very much ask of everyone to forgive the addict, but not to save him from the consequences of his behaviors because feeling these consequences, no matter how unfavorable or severe at the pre-

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sent time, are the experiences that will later on become his most valuable assets. Keep in mind that God Himself doesn't undo what we set into motion, but His promise is He will never leave you or forsake you. And that means he is going through these trying times with you. The temptation to become frustrated, I've learned, comes from our fears and hopeless beliefs that the loved one has not gotten well enough fast enough for us, so patience is the key, tolerance is the door all of us will have to walk through, and in this walking the problem child is going to have to learn that you are always there. And anger, if we look at it honestly, is rooted in fear and hurt because we just don't understand, and we question ourselves and place upon ourselves unrealistic guilt of believing it's our fault.

What advice would you give young people to keep them off drugs?

When someone advocates that drugs are the answer to feeling better, think long and hard because the feelings you are trying to escape and the way you feel about yourself are not worth the long term hell that you will experience through a chaotic existence that will push you to the very brink of self destruction. There is saying I've adopted in my life that helps me today deal with anything that comes my way; This too shall pass. And what I mean by this, is no matter what these feelings are eventually they will go away, but I have to aim to speak more honestly with myself in the light of God's truth because, in actuality, this is where my true worth comes from, and the only feeling that I need to experience is the love of God embracing the love of me. Then, there won't be a need for something outside of you to make the inside of you feel good.

What advice would you give to an addict?

The first step is recognition and admission that no matter what you do in and of yourself, this enemy will kick your butt every time. Secondly, it's about submission, it's about me stepping off the throne and allowing God to take His rightful place as Lord of your life. The third step is willingness. Being willing to do whatever it takes to receive the help I need. Also, remember that your situation and state is not a hopeless one. You can overcome with the help of God, others, and the cooperation of yourself.

Anything else you want to say?

It's always been a blessing to me to be a help to others, but it's also been a blessing to receive and accept the help of others. My journey is not yet over. It's a work in progress. And, today, I'm not in such a hurry to out run God and time as to allow myself to miss the blessing of enjoying life the way God intended. Today, I'm allowing God to hold on to me, and that's a blessed security, because no matter what happens, whether good, bad, or indifferent, **all things, all things**, work out for the good of those who love the Lord. I have some very important people in my life today. I have a spiritual father who has shown unconditional love since the year of 1999 and whose mentoring is only excelled by Jesus Christ Himself. I have a well spring of friends that advise and stand in front of me to intervene when self has gotten in the way, not afraid of running the risk of me getting angry. I also have someone in my life today, affectionately known as my Angel, who helps me with my heart situation. So, to anyone out there suffering or have someone suffering from addiction, my love, my empathy, my prayers, and my God, I pray, will forever be with you. AMEN.


